2 Corinthians 5:18-20

"No one is to appear before me empty-handed" (Exo. 23:15; 34:20).

The OT speaks about forgiveness (Psalm 32:1-2; Romans 4:7-8) but any reconciling is up to man approaching God with an offering

¹⁸ All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation:

"Reconciliation means the restoration of a good relationship between enemies." (p. 145, NIDNTT)

- 1. God is the subject, the one doing the reconciling
- 2. God reconciled us to himself (see also Romans 5:10-12)
- 3. All Christians are <u>called</u> to this ministry team

¹⁹ that God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ, not counting people's sins against them. And he has committed to us the message of reconciliation.

- 1. The grounds or basis of reconciliation is God's work in Christ
- 2. God offers salvation freely to <u>all</u> having reconciled the world
- 3. God doesn't keep track ; He longer counts our sins vs. us
- 4. Getting that message out is what counts

²⁰ We are therefore Christ's ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us. We implore you on Christ's behalf: Be reconciled to God.

- 1. His ambassadors, honestly! What was God thinking?
- 2. Imploring/begging has the ideas of urgency and emotion
- 3. Reconciliation is incomplete until accepted by both sides

Being reconciled to God eliminates pride & elevates worship

- 4. Where do you see examples in your own life of trying to please God (in order to be reconciled) instead of trusting God (that, in fact, He has already reconciled you to himself in Christ)?
